✤ A Note from Rev. Toni McSorley



When I first moved into the St. James Parsonage, I brought along the bulbs of some of my favorite flower: the Iris. I don't think I could explain why I favor the blooms so much, but they mean a lot to me and I love it when they appear in the Spring. I have had them everywhere I have lived, so it seemed only natural to bring them here.

'Double petal' blue Iris, deep Purple Iris, Golden Iris, and Black Iris are some of the bulbs I brought and planted. Last year none bloomed, but I expected that since they almost never bloom the first year after being planted. They still need loving care through that time, while they get accustomed to their new surroundings, so I took good care of them while they adjusted. This year the tips of some of them are peeking out, signaling that soon the blooms will burst forth in radiant colors.

This region of East Tennessee is so beautiful, it made me wonder at the time why I was bothering with a few more flowers. Only now do I understand why the Spirit moved me to take the time and trouble to bring the Iris here. They are a visible reminder of the work of the Lord.

We bring the Good News of Jesus to a heart that may be full of many good things (or not) but something is missing. At first, the message we bring may not immediately take root and bloom inside the people we are trying to reach. We can't make the message bloom; we cannot force it in any way to grow and change and brighten the spirit of the other person. What we can do is wait, patiently, and have faith that it will bloom in the right time. Tending those folks with love and care enables their faith to take root, grow, and eventually blossom.

We sometimes forget that the Holy Spirit has it all in hand when we think that the success of our message to others is all about us doing it 'right.' Jesus never gave us a formula; he never scolded the disciples for failure if a listener rejected the Good News. We are just to bring the message and then yield the gardening tools to the Holy Spirit. We aren't to get prideful if the person's heart blossoms, nor are we to be discouraged if that fails to happen. It may take a lot of time, but we must have faith that the best will come to pass. I am not making the Iris bloom, that's something only the nature of the Creator can do. My job was simply to bring the bulbs, plant them, tend them patiently for a year and wait. I couldn't bully them, plead with them, or nag them to make them bloom. They needed loving care, but I know God is always in charge of the blooms. And when the blooms do happen, I get to celebrate and thank the Lord for the beauty, knowing the flowers will now spread and there will be many more of them to come!

Let us go forth this Spring to garden for the Lord, planting his message and caring for others, trusting the Holy Spirit to grow faith in the people we tend with compassion and love. What a beautiful garden we are privileged to work in. Thank you, Lord!
